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

YouTube Videos: They Aren't All Cats! by Karin

I've used YouTube videos to learn how to do home repairs, crafts projects, etc., but I was surprised when a student told me she was learning to write in cursive from videos. I hadn't thought about YouTube as a learning tool in that way. Since her time with her tutor was best spent on writing and comprehension, this was a way to learn something relevant to her, independent of her tutor. Videos are convenient and available, as long as you have computer/internet access, to watch when and where you'd like. You don't have to be able to read to learn, just watch and listen!

Videos are often more current than information in a textbook, are short, have a variety of topics to choose from, and offer access to some of the top experts in a field. As in anything on the internet, you need to be sure to check the source of the materials since not everything you find is accurate. Sometimes you encounter videos made by people who just proclaim themselves experts - anyone can post a video.

Here are some videos you might find interesting:

Speech Sound Production/Phonics (Note that some videos use British dialect which might be confusing for some.)

- "Jolly Phonics Letter Sounds" (American English, 9 minutes) – woman demonstrates how to say 42 speech sounds in American English; sounds are said twice, followed by an example word and the letters representing those sounds
- "Learning English: Sounds of the Alphabet" (10 minutes) close-up of woman's mouth as she produces the sounds of the alphabet in order

Reading, Dyslexia, and the Brain

- "How The Brain Learns To Read" (3 minutes)
- "Reading Can Change Your Brain" (3 minutes)
- "How the Brain Learns to Read" (30 minutes, Prof. Stanislas Dehaene)
