#### Using Games to Learn by Maya

We all know how important it is to teach phonics and grammar, but after slugging through lesson after lesson on a dense topic, it's easy to feel bored or restless. Try breaking up your lessons with engaging, educational games. Having fun not only helps people learn, but it keeps them motivated when they're feeling stuck.

In the Pleasant Hill Library's Discovery & Exploration Nook, or DEN (formerly the Computer Lab), we have games and activities organized by skill. You and your student may come and try any of them, or you can use these ideas to create similar tutoring activities in your local library.

**Phonics & Spelling:** Letters and sounds are the foundations of reading and writing, but they can also be difficult to teach. Check out PSC's kinetic sand, which allows you to sculpt 3D letters and words. Sand letters are not only relaxing and fun, they're also more forgiving and less intimidating than paper and pen. The DEN also features foam paint, which is great for sight words or tricky sound patterns. Shaving cream works just as well. Just be sure to cover your work space with newspaper, or do this outdoors in the summer.

**Reading:** The DEN has one reading comprehension board game. Players read passages and answer questions about them in order to escape from a desert island. For a fun reading exercise that can be done anywhere, print lines from a short scene or play to run through with your student. Aspiring actors who want the classic dramas without Elizabethan slang can try the website No Fear Shakespeare (<u>nfs.sparknotes.com</u>), where plays are rewritten in modern-day English, line by line. Extra credit for costumes!

Writing: Because writing often requires imagination, it can be both scary and fun. The DEN has a small box of questions like, "What would you most like to do for someone else if you had the money and time?" A great piece of writing could begin as a conversation, sometimes a silly or strange one. Record your conversation with your phone or PSC's USB voice recorder. When your student is ready, have them write their words as they listen to their own recorded voice. The DEN also features a choose-your-own-adventure game on the bulletin board. Spin three colored wheels to find a character, a setting, and an action, and then see what kind of crazy story comes from it. If you're offsite, try a laid-back game of scrabble (phone scrabble works just as well) to generate words your student is comfortable with. At the end of the game, have your student write a paragraph using some words on the scrabble board.

The joy of using games to learn is that there are no repercussions for mistakes. Relax, laugh, and of course, don't keep score.


#### **New Tutor Training**
