Summer Breaks

Summer is marked by long, warm days and breaks from the usual routine of tutoring sessions. Breaks are good—we come back renewed, energized and ready to tackle more learning. Summer is also a time for students to apply what was learned in textbooks to their daily life activities.

If your student is traveling during the summer, have them put new skills to use in planning the trip and reading road signs, travel guides, and tourist information. Students could keep a journal of their trips, send postcards, e-mail tutors about their adventures, or take pictures and write notes about them. Teach them to preserve their memories through written thoughts.

If you will be out of town, PSC has three computer labs for students to use in your absence. Talk to staff about scheduling a session or two. If the student uses a home computer, check out free online sites, such as *Lemons for Literacy, vocabulary.com, TV411*, and *Spelling City*. Do they use apps on their iPhone? Try *Phonics Genius*.

The library is also rich with resources. Discover & Go offers free or reduced price tickets to a variety of Bay Area museums and venues. Beginning in July, we are excited to have available on the library's website two new programs. Pronunciator is designed to help people learn any of 80 languages, including English. The Testing and Education Reference Center includes study skills and practice for standardized tests, such as the GED, TOEFL, US Citizenship, and many technical trade exams. The theme of the library's Summer Reading Festival is *Read to the Rhythm*. Ask your student to read a book or listen to the audio, and then write a review in order to be entered in a drawing for a Kindle Fire, Berkley Rep tickets, or other nice prizes. There are programs for all age groups and many special events in the branches around the county. Make summer reading a family event!

Family Fun with Stories to Go (STG)

With long summer days ahead, there will be plenty of time to do things you enjoy and want to explore. If you want to read to a



child, the library will have kits for your use. The kits are called *Stories to Go (STG)* and are developed for adults to 'spread the joy of reading to young children from birth to age seven. The kits consist of 5 themed picture books and a related activity, all housed in a canvas carrying bag. Each *STG* kit circulates as one item.'

To get *STG* kits, use your library card to check out one from your local library's circulation desk. With a 21 day loan period you'll have plenty of time to enjoy the entire kit with your child.
