How Students Help PSC by Kate

Students often tell us that PSC has changed their lives and that they are extremely grateful for the time, kindness, and knowledge their tutors and the program have shared with them. They sometimes say they wish they had something to give in return. There is actually much that PSC students can and do give to the program every day.

Over the last year, PSC students have:

- shown PSC tutors and staff what bravery, hard work, resilience, and perseverance look like;

- told friends and acquaintances about PSC, leading to new students, tutors, and supporters;

- given PSC staff useful feedback on our methods and materials;

- contributed stories to *In Our Words*, our annual book of student writings (stories of 400 words or fewer are due May 31);

- attended PSC workshops, like Book Club, that contribute to the PSC learning community;

- participated as both students and facilitators of the Adult Learner Leadership Institute;

- given PSC permission to take their photos for flyers and online promotions;

- put PSC flyers up on bulletin boards in their communities;

- visited new Tutor Training classes to answer questions from every new batch of tutors;

- recorded their literacy stories for PSC radio ads;

- given talks about their literacy stories at PSC Recognition Events and various PSC fundraisers;

- served on our PSC, Inc. fundraising board;

- donated directly to PSC, Inc. and attended their fundraisers.

Of course, students don't have to do *any* of these things simply attending tutoring sessions twice a week and working towards personal goals is plenty! But we'd be happy to talk to any student who wants to learn more about these and other ways to help the program.



More Productive Tutoring Sessions

For more productive tutoring sessions, minimize distractions and interruptions.

One pair reports they stopped answering their cell phones. The tutor and student told family and friends they were not available during their tutoring sessions and had a great session, unlike prior sessions. Respect each other's time and give yourself the gift of uninterrupted learning.
