How to Sound Out the BIG Words

Help in Hard Times

Tutors can't be everything to their students – and PSC doesn't expect you to be. But we know our tutors are caring, supportive people who want to do as much as they can to help. However, boundaries are important, and there should be limits to how you help. For example, you shouldn't act as a therapist, a financial counselor, or a legal advisor. The best way to help your student in hard times is to **act as a referral source**. Here are some resources to keep in mind:

- 1. 211 Students can call 2-1-1 (a toll-free number) and speak with a Contra Costa County referral professional or volunteer who will direct them to relevant health or social services. If your student would rather not use the phone, there is a website one can access free of charge:

 www.211database.org. If your student's goal is to use the internet, you could incorporate finding a specific service on the website into a lesson. Both the phone number and website are available any time, any day.
- 2. One Stop Career Centers To help your student find a job, encourage your student to take advantage of One Stop Centers. There are several located in the county (Antioch, Brentwood, Concord, Richmond, and San Pablo). To access their services, students would need to register online at www.eastbayworks.com/cccounty. Then, on their first visit to the actual office, students are given a card that allows them to access available services. Services are free and can include career counseling, skill and need assessments, internet and phone access, training in specific computer software programs (ex. Word or Excel), and periodic workshops on topics ranging from customer service skills to stress reduction. Use of these services is a great example of how one might meet the "Access Community Resources" goal on your student's goal sheet.
- 3. Library Your local library has a wealth of information available, and if you and your student


- aren't sure where to start, ask a library staff member; they can often point you in the right direction. Using the library as a resource would be a great way to teach research skills. Also, some libraries have volunteers available to teach computer skills if your student wants more computer help than you can offer.
- 4. PSC Staff Don't forget to ask us! We hear about resources through professional connections as well as from tutors and students. It is possible that we might have the name of an organization that can help.

REMINDER: No Children at PSC Lessons

Even when children are out of school for the summer, please remember that PSC students should not bring their children to lessons. It is difficult for students to concentrate if they are overseeing their child at the same time. Contra Costa County Library policy is that children under age eight must be directly supervised by someone at least fifteen years old.

Computer Lab News

Looking for a way to shake up your lessons? The websites englishmaven.org, englishforeveryone.org, and readtheory.org are sister sites





English for Everyone and English Maven are very helpful to developing writers. They offer a variety of worksheets on grammar and the craft of sentence and paragraph building. These sites also feature games, such as cross word puzzles and word searches, for days when you need to relax and have fun while learning.

Read Theory is geared toward comprehension and vocabulary in context. The site allows you to read a passage and then answer comprehension and vocabulary questions once you're finished. It requires a log-in with a valid email address whereas the first two websites can be used without creating an account.

All three websites can be used within the frame of a lesson or as supplemental practice at home. They also may be perfect for those summer months when folks go on vacation. Print out the worksheets and hand write the answers, or use the exercises in the PSC computer lab or anywhere with internet access. Enjoy!
