
For Students, By Students

Fake News

If it's in print, it must be true! That is a common notion among new readers. Even experienced readers are sometimes fooled by fake news. How do you evaluate things you and your learner read? What is fake news and why do people create it? What is the difference between fact and opinion? How do you spot fake news?

There are now many websites you can browse to help you and your student become a more discerning reader.

- Check out the Contra Costa County Library's *Adults* 50+ Guide, http://guides.ccclib.org/FindingFacts. There you will find a concise "How to Spot Fake News" guide. There are links to sites such as FactCheck.org, which monitors the factual accuracy of U.S. political players, and Snopes.com to check the accuracy of rumors.

Temporary Parking Change at PSC Office


