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You can find the meaning of words in orange in the Glossary on page 8.





In Our Words has a new deadline for stories in 2023: April 15, 2023.


Why so early? PSC has reorganized our calendar year. We will print *In Our Words* for the PSC Recognition Event on June 10.

I definitely recommend it because the book is very interesting and keeps you page turning to the end.





Activity for Learners and Tutors

Tutor/Learner Activity: Bag of Rocks

We all have stress. Mental health can be hurt by stress. Talking about stress is a good learning opportunity and can help mental health. This is a tutor/learner activity for talking about stress. See page 6 for more about mental health.



Steps:

- 1. Read the short story *Bag of Rocks* below. Learners can read it themselves, or tutors can read it out loud to learners.
- 2. Pick a specific stress and put it in the story. For example, for a learner from another country, moving to the United States can be a stress. Parenting can also be a stress.
- 3. After reading the story, look at the discussion questions.
- 4. Fill out the chart, either with writing or just talking. Tutors can share their own Bag of Rocks to help learners feel comfortable.

Bag of Rocks

Life can be stressful. Everyone feels stress sometimes. Some stresses are big; others are small.

Adults who are learning a new skill, like reading and writing, might carry pressure and bad memories about going to school. (This is where the learner and tutor can put a specific stress in the story).

When we have stress, our invisible bag of rocks is *HEAVY*. Some rocks can be big and heavy and stay in your bag for a long time. Some rocks may feel smaller and lighter. If we have too many small rocks, they can be difficult, too.

We can do things to make our bag of rocks lighter. We don't have to carry our rocks alone. One example is sharing a conversation about stress, or writing about it.

Discussion Questions:

- 1) Think about when you started your learning journey. How heavy was your bag of rocks then? How heavy is it now?
- 2) What are some examples of "small rocks" and "big rocks" that you have?
- 3) What are some of the stresses and hopes you have?
