### The Three Sounds of -ed

English sounds can be put into two groups. Some sounds make your throat vibrate and some don't. Put your hand on your throat and say the sound of the letter k (like the first sound of kite); there should be no vibration. Now, put your hand on your throat and say the sound of g (like the first sound of game); you should feel a vibration. Vowel sounds vibrate.

The suffix -ed can make three different sounds when you add it to the end of a word. It can say the sound of t, the sound of d, or "ed." The sound it makes changes based on the last sound of the base word. Does the last sound in the word vibrate? Then, say the d sound for -ed. If it doesn't vibrate, say the t sound. And if the last sound of the word is a t sound or a d sound, then say "ed" for -ed.

For example, the last sound of the word help is the sound of p. Since it has no vibration, you say the t sound for -ed. You say helped as "helpt." The last sound of the word note is a t sound, so you say -ed as "ed" in noted. And finally, the last sound of the word hum is "mmmm." Since "mmmm" vibrates, you say hummed as "humd."

Sort the following words into groups. If the suffix -ed in the word has the t sound, put it in the group on the left. If -ed says the d sound, put it in the middle group. If -ed says "ed," put it in the last group on the right.

Answers: -ed says t sound: beeped, coughed (cough ends in the f sound), kicked, kissed -ed says d sound: begged, filled, played (play ends in the long a sound), rubbed

# Tip for Tutors

## Using Newsela

PSC is always looking for engaging content for our adult learners while they work to improve reading. Our learners are interested in current events, and many of our learners' goals relate to reading a newspaper.

Newspapers like The San Francisco Chronicle or The New York Times are written above a high school level, which is out of reach for many of our learners.

So that is why PSC really likes Newsela: <u>www.newsela.com</u>. We encourage tutors to explore this unique news site.

Newsela offers:

- Choice: Learners or tutors—or both can choose which articles they want to read. There is a wide variety! A recent search of the site showed articles titled "Beyoncé becomes first Black woman to top billboard country music chart" to "Sweden Officially Joins NATO."
- Lexile Level Options: This is our favorite feature. You can adjust the Lexile level, or difficulty of text level, of each article. For example, the Beyoncé article mentioned above can be read at the easiest level of 610 Lexile (about a 3<sup>rd</sup> to 4<sup>th</sup> grade level) to an above high school Lexile level. Tutors can challenge their learners to read the same article at different levels. Also, tutors can note progress when their learners are



reading more comfortably at higher Lexile levels. If you do not know the Lexile level of your learner, please reach out to your tutor/learner coordinator.

- Listening: If the reading level is above your learner's level or you just want to practice reading in a multisensory way, there is a listening option for each article.
- Comprehension Practice: There are before and after reading activities that go with the articles. Newsela lists the main idea of the article before you read.
- Sharing: Newsela is easy to access. You can share screens if tutoring virtually, or print the articles out.
