In July 2024, I had the pleasure of teaching a beginner ESL class at Project Second Chance. The learners worked hard, and we had a blast! Here are three highlights:

 Learners loved practicing their English with our special guests: they presented an "I am" collage with pictures and words about

- themselves to PSC workers, practiced conversation questions with previous PSC tutees, and presented about their hobbies to PSC tutors!
- 2. Real-world activities were helpful to practice English. Learners worked on food vocabulary by visiting the Concord Farmers Market and asking the farmers questions. They also created a weather report with cities around the world and searched for apartments with a classmate.
- 3. Lastly, we played fun pronunciation games to practice tricky sounds (for example, 16 vs. 60; slip vs. sleep). Learners used fly swatters to slap the correct sound before the other team!

October: A Month to Celebrate Dyslexia and Its Unique Strengths


October is Dyslexia Awareness Month.

Tip for Tutors

Learner Self-Reflection

Ali Tubio is an English as a Second Language instructor with 15 years of experience teaching at community colleges and most recently, the Project Second Chance

Ali offers this tip for having learners monitor progress.

"It can be hard for learners to see their progress. Create a list of specific tasks worked on over the last month (example-"I can write a sentence about my family") and have learners reflect on their learning using a "stoplight" picture next to each item. Each color means:



Red = STOP! I need more explanation and examples.

Yellow = I still need some practice.

Green = GO! I understand, and I can do this by myself.

Have the learner talk to you about where they are on the stoplight. This gives you insight for lessons and keeps learners motivated."
